ANGELS HAVE CHARGE OVER US - BILLY GRAHM DEVOTION

[He is my refuge . . . - Psalm 91:2](#)

Modern psychiatrists say that one of the basic needs of man is security. In the 91st Psalm we are assured that in God we have the greatest of security, “There shall no evil befall thee, neither shall any plague come nigh thy dwelling. For He shall give His angels charge over thee, to keep thee in all thy ways.” If you read and reread this beautiful Psalm, you will discover that in Him we have a permanent abode and residence, and that all of the comfort, security, and affection which the human heart craves is found in Him. Perhaps no visible angels will appear in your life and mine, but God’s promise of security is nonetheless real and certain. Those who live in the realm of God have genuine safety and security.

Prayer: Wherever I go this day, You and Your angels will be with me. Thank you, Lord, for the peace, love, and security You promise.

RAPTURE OF THE CHURCH

While critics argue that the word “rapture” does not appear in Scripture, the event itself clearly does. The Bible talks about the great catching up of the church in Thessalonians. Supernatural “raptures” have already occurred in biblical history. Enoch was raptured... so was Elijah... and John himself in Revelation went to heaven because he heard the words, ‘Come up hither.’

1 Thessalonians 4:13–17, describes how “the Lord Himself shall descend from heaven with a shout... and the dead in Christ shall rise first,” followed by

living believers being “caught up together with them in the clouds.”

1 Corinthians 15, the apostle Paul describes a mystery in which believers will be changed “in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye.” This transformation is central to Christian hope. “Some of us will not experience death, but we shall all be changed.”

Jesus’ warning in Luke 21:34–36 played a central role. “Take heed to yourselves,” warning that hearts weighed down by “the cares of this life” could cause believers to miss that day. Which means if they’re not living a holy life, they will miss that day.

Scripture consistently shows that God separates the righteous from judgment. He referenced Noah, Lot and Abraham’s intercession for Sodom, noting, “God will not destroy the righteous and the wicked together.”

Believers are “not appointed unto wrath,” 1 Thessalonians 5:9, Christ promised to keep faithful believers “from the hour of temptation” in Revelation 3:10.

Still, not everyone who claims faith will qualify. 1 John 2:28, “If you abide in Him, you won’t be ashamed when He returns.” Abiding requires surrender. “The price is death to self and the world.”

Paul took this very seriously. 1 Corinthians 9:27, Paul admitted the danger of becoming “a castaway” if he failed to discipline his body. “It’s not how you start the race that matters, It’s how you finish it.”

Ultimately, Hinn ended his message on a hopeful note. Quoting Jude 24, he reminded believers that God is “able to keep you from falling” and to present them “faultless... with exceeding joy.”

The Christian life is simple, once you give your life to Jesus... it doesn’t say **try harder**, **It says yield**.

Don’t Forsake the Assembly


Certain Bible verses demand to be quoted in the King James Version, and Hebrews 10:25 is one of them. Following calls to “hold fast the profession of our faith without wavering” (v. 23) and provoke one another “unto love and to good works” (v. 24) is an exhortation even more direct: Christians should not be “forsaking the assembling of ourselves together, as the manner of some is.”

This is indeed the manner of some—today in ways the epistle’s unknown writer could not have anticipated. Human foibles are the same as ever, but 21st-century Christians have excuses for forsaking the assembly that first-century Christians could not muster: You can always just listen to a sermon podcast. You can pick up that extra shift or sleep a little longer or take your kid to the travel soccer tournament and make it up to God when the next episode drops. Well, you can do these things in the sense that this technology is available and no one will keep you from using it. But you can’t replace Sunday morning with a recording and presume that you’ve been to church.

Digital “attendance” is a misnomer. Even the best sermon podcast or live-stream is not church, and a durable, dogged, in-person, on-paper, in-public commitment to a local church is a necessary part of the Christian life. Church is “not an optional add-on,” said theologian Brad East. It is how we learn to be human as God intended. Indeed, it makes possible truly human life before God.

Sometimes, of course, we find ourselves in extenuating circumstances. Some Christians must contend with sickness or disability that makes church attendance physically impossible, perhaps for a long time. Their local congregations have a duty to bring church to them, insofar as that is feasible. Some Christians live under persecution or in places where there literally are no local congregations or have some other hardship that renders the exhortation in Hebrews a word of future hope rather than a near-term reality.
