Columbus was called mad because he decided to sail the uncharted ocean. . . . Martin Luther was called mad because he presumed to defy the entrenched religious hierarchy of his time. Patrick Henry was considered mad when he cried, "Give me liberty, or give me death!" George Washington was thought to be mad when he decided to continue the war after the winter at Valley Forge, when thousands of his men had died and other thousands had deserted, leaving him only a handful of men. We have become too sophisticated and respectable to be called mad in our generation. Christianity has become so respectable and so conventional that it is now insipid. The salt has lost its flavor. . . . Would to God that the world found us Christians dangerous enough to call us mad, in these days when materialism and secularism are sweeping over the world. Thank God there are those who sacrifice time, talents, social position, and lucrative posts, and who fling aside every advantage in order to serve the Kingdom of God.

BEWARE OF SELF-PITY - JENTEZEN FRANKLIN

No one should seek their own good, but the good of others." 1 Cor 10:24 NIV

Self-pity can be deadly. It tells the wife and mother who works hard, "You're not appreciated." It says to the office worker, "Look how valuable you are, yet you're never recognized or rewarded." It says to the unemployed, "No chance!" To the divorced, "No place!" To the bereaved, "No hope!" And to the struggling, "No way!" Look at the prophet Elijah. Twenty-four hours after his greatest victory, he is deeply depressed and wallowing in self-pity. "I have had enough...Take my life...I have zealously served...But the people of Israel have broken their covenant with you, torn down your altars, and killed...your prophets. I am the only one left, and now they are trying to kill me, too" (1Ki 19:4, 10 NLT). There it is—self-pity in the raw! Generally speaking, there are two reasons behind self-pity. The first is emotional manipulation. We use self-pity as a weapon to guilt-trip others and get our own way.

That's immaturity and you have to deal with it, whether it's in yourself or somebody else. On the other hand, self-pity can also stem from sheer exhaustion. Recorded in the Old Testament, God showed Elijah four behaviors he needed to correct to get himself back on track: (1) He needed more rest. (2) He needed to eat better. (3) He had to turn his eyes to God and stop trying to do everything in his own strength. (4) He was isolated and needed a friend. So, God gave him Elisha. That did the job, and the next time we see Elijah, he is back on top. Take a moment today and think about how you can apply this to your life. ever!

ALL YOUR NEEDS - JOEL OSTEEN

These things dominate the thoughts of unbelievers, but your Heavenly Father already knows all your needs. Matthew 6:32 NLT

We all have plenty of reasons to live worried and stressed, trying to fix everything in our own strength. That's overwhelming. Come back to a place of peace. Your Heavenly Father knows all your needs. He knows what you're facing. He knows the

dreams He's placed in your heart. He sees the struggles, the unfair situations, the times you were put at a disadvantage. You don't have to do life on your own, trying to make up for it, trying to accomplish the dream. Jesus says, "Come to Me, and I will give you rest." Stop depending on your own efforts, your own ability. That striving is draining. If you start depending on Him, you'll feel that load lift off you. God has you in the palms of His hands. He hasn't let go of you. If you're going to feel His strength and see His favor, you have to put Him first place and abide in Him. You can only do so much in your own efforts. Do what you can, and then leave it up to God.

PETE HEGSETH: MESSAGE TO THE CHURCH: 'CHRIST IS KING'

U.S. Secretary of War Pete Hegseth is making one thing very clear: Jesus Christ is Lord of all. In his speech at NRB 2026, Hegseth made it clear that under his leadership in America, Christians will continue to be able to freely proclaim the name of Jesus as Lord of all.



"As long as I have breath, I commit to you that I, and we should never allow any group, no matter how large or small, to silence us from speaking the capital 'T' Truth," Hegseth said. "Christ is King. He died for our sins. We are forgiven. And He will come again in glory, Amen."

Hegseth's bold declaration was more than a political soundbite—it was a moment of clarity in a culture often clouded by compromise. In an era when many leaders shrink back from publicly professing faith, his unapologetic proclamation that "Christ is King" signaled conviction and courage.

At a time when persecution feels closer than ever—when cultural hostility toward biblical Christianity is no longer subtle but increasingly overt—this kind of clarity offers hope. The church is not called to retreat but to rise.

Now is the hour to embolden believers, strengthen pulpits and ignite evangelism with fresh fire. Rather than fearing what may come, we can seize this moment to spread the fire of the Holy Spirit to the whole world around us.
